Approximately 40% in localized areas in the northwest and south east portions of the site. The remaining site is rolling with slopes at 2%-5%.

 Erosion is not anticipated due to the dry weather season for construction and controls that will be in place during the work including a stabilized construction entrance, covering of stockpiles, and silt fence as needed.

No work will take place directly adjacent to Lake Cle Elum. Any proposed development will stay outside of designated setback areas.
